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On 12 March 2000, for the first time in Morocco, Islamist organizations such as Al-'Adl wa-l- Ihsan (Justice and Benevolence) and Hizb al-'Adala wa-l-Tanmiyya, or PJD (the Party of Justice and Development),15publicly engaged with the "woman question" by staging a march in Casablanca, the country's economic capital, in opposition to a feminist demonstration organized in Rabat demanding a revision of the Family Code.
